Our mission is to foster inclusive communities through oral history, writing and art programs that improve student learning, affirm identity and enhance cross-cultural understanding.

This year has truly been a year of growth. Through our signature in-school Arts, Cultural and Literacy Connections (ACL) program, hundreds of youth discovered cultural connections while improving their arts and literacy skills. This year, many program themes included engaging students in learning about social justice and civic engagement. The program was held in partnership with eight schools.

This year, we also piloted a new after-school dance program called BOOST (Building Out-of-School Time). Located in Pilsen at the Union League Boys and Girls Club, BOOST connects youth from Chicago schools, while engaging them in culture and dance concepts.



Overall, our in-school, after-school and outreach programs impacted more than 15,000 Chicago area residents and took place throughout the entire year. Through year-long public art exhibitions along the Lake Michigan lakefront and in Bridgeport's Palmisano Park, our Ten Thousand Ripples Buddha sculptures reached more than a million people.

More than 11.000 children benefitted from our programs at 25 schools and BOOST.

At the end of the year, we celebrated the distinguished leadership of Changing Worlds' first executive director, Mark Rodriguez. Over 12 years, Mark led and established Changing Worlds as a notable nonprofit. We send Mark best wishes in his new endeavors.

Maria Miranda is serving as Interim Executive Director. Maria has been a staff member for seven years. managing resource development and communications. In the coming months, an email update will be published about our Executive Director search.
